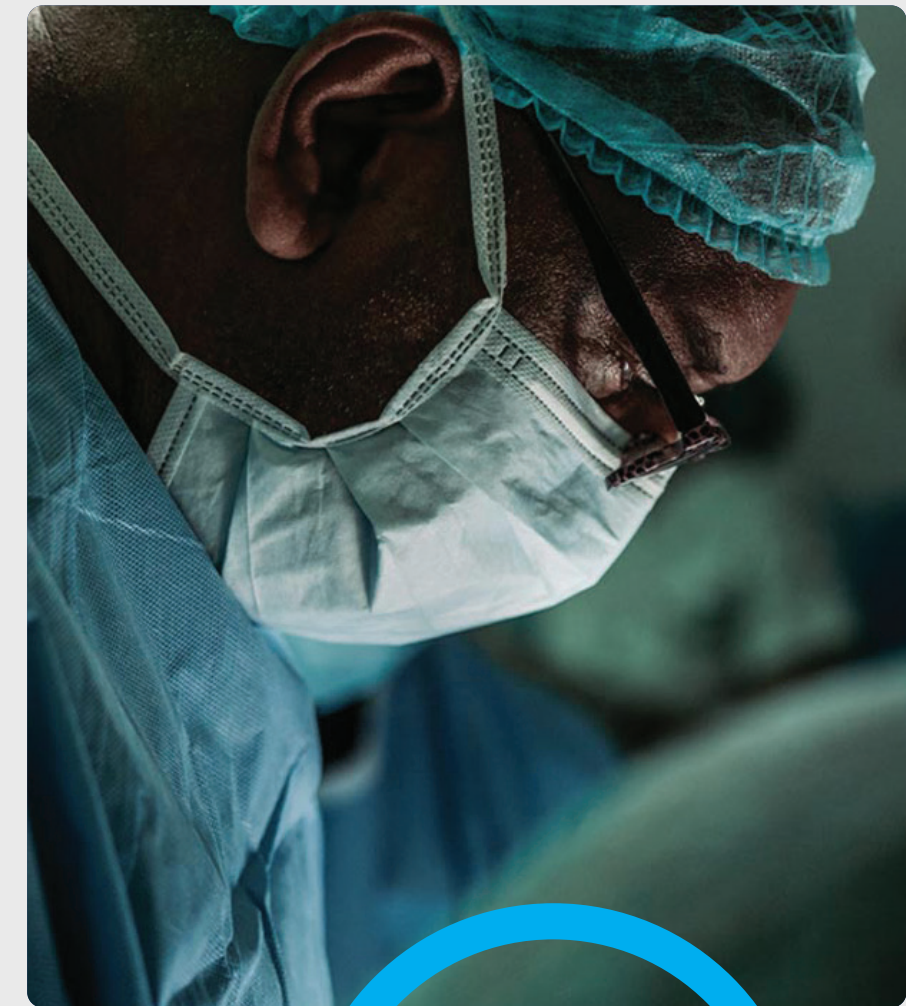

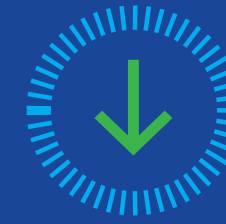

What We Clean.

Shared Common Touch Points (CTP's)

are the most critical surfaces to be cleaned and disinfected. We recommend mapping out all of the CTP's in your facility so you can assign responsibility and frequency of cleaning.



SHARED COMMON TOUCH POINTS

- Door handle, plate or knob
- Office Chair Rail
- Stair or Hall Rail
- Drinking Fountain
- Vending Machine
- Cafeteria Tables
- Desktop
- Restroom Faucet Knob
- Restroom Toilet Seat
- Restroom Toilet/Urinal Handle
- Restroom Floor
- Restroom Dispensers
- Hand Sanitizer Dispensers

Create a Cleaning Schedule.

The schedule should include “standard” cleaning and “outbreak” cleaning. Create a threshold/event for which schedule should be used. For instance, when absenteeism goes above a certain percentage, go into Outbreak Cleaning mode.

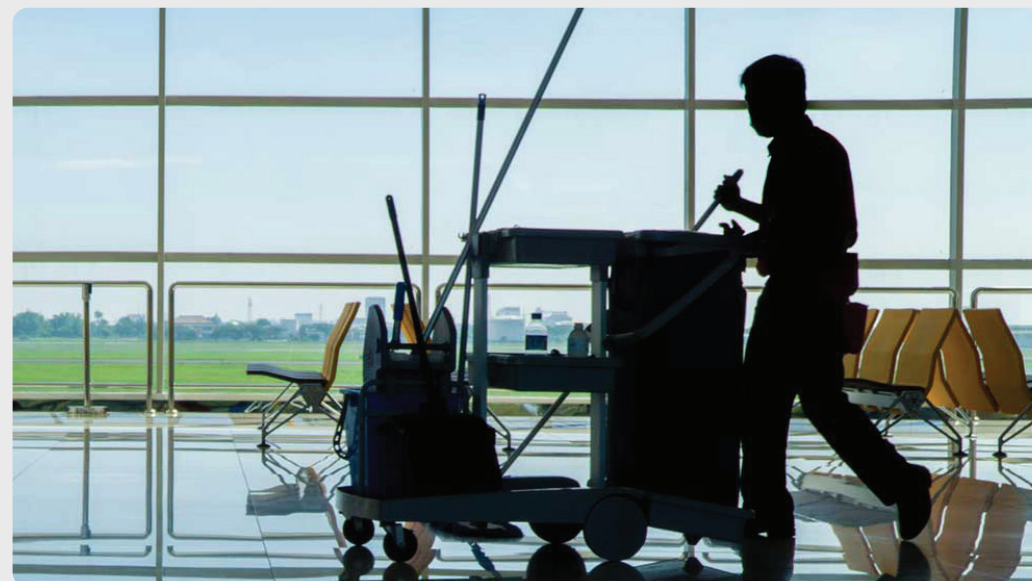
